'Alihi Scholarship

- Recipients must be residents of Ko'olau Poko, O'ahu (region measured by zip code: Kualoa, Hakupu'u, Waiakane, Waiahole, Ka'alaea, Waihe'e Kahalu'u, Heeia, Kane'ohe, Kailua, Waimanalo)
- Recipients may be enrolled part-time or full-time as a classified student in a post-secondary school institution
- Demonstrated community service and/or participation in athletics measured through mandatory application essay questions
- Submit one (1) letter of recommendation from a community organization or coach who can comment on applicant's overall character, achievement and contribution to serve the greater community
- Discuss either an on- or off-campus activity that you've participated in that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or your career goal

'Ohana Cachola Scholarship

- GPA - 2.0 minimum
- High school graduating senior and enrolling in first year of college
- Demonstrate financial need
- Priority given to applicants who are current residents of North Kohala, Hawai'i (zip codes 96719, 96755)
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? How have these financial hardships affected your academic and personal life? What strategies or resources have you utilized to manage or overcome these financial challenges?

1982 Green Machine Scholarship

- GPA 3.0 minimum
- Junior or Senior standing in college
- Demonstrate leadership/school service
- Demonstrate community service
- Priority given to a non-traditional student (single parent, sole provider, homeless, disabled, ward of the court)
- The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- Discuss either an on- or off-campus activity that you've participated in that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or your career goal.

- GPA 2.5 minimum
- Undergraduate student at a US accredited institution recognized by Pauahi Foundation

2017 Great Whites Scholarship

- Major in Natural Sciences (Astronomy, Geology, Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Anthropology)

Admiral Kihune Scholarship

Vice Admiral Robert K.U. Kihune (Ret.), Kamehameha Schools Class of 1955, served as a Trustee of the Kamehameha Schools. His Admiral assignments included: Commander of USS Kitty Hawk, USS Nimitz Aircraft Carrier Battle Groups, Commander of Naval Surface Forces of the Pacific Fleet, and Assistant Chief of Naval Operations for Surface Warfare. He retired after his assignment as Chief of Naval Education and Training. As one of 30 vice admirals in the U.S. Navy, Kihune achieve the highest rank of any Hawaiian in the U.S. military. He is a 1959 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy.

- Major in Science, Technology, Engineering or Math
- Attending the University of Hawai'i at Hilo or University of Hawai'i at Mānoa

Ali'i Chang Scholarship

- Must demonstrate field of study and interest in Agriculture
- Must attend a post-secondary institution in State of Hawai'i

Allen A. Bailey Scholarship

- Must major in Pre-School Education
- Must be a graduate student
- Priority given to Kamehameha School graduates; however, non-KS grads will be considered

Amona and Suzel Ho STEM Leaders Scholarship

- Two- or four-year undergraduate degree in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math)
- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation: one (1) from a teacher or counselor and one (1) from an employer or community organization who can comment on your overall character, achievement and contribution to serve the greater community

Anne H. Myers Scholarship

- State of Hawai'i Resident
- Demonstrate a well-rounded record of achievement

Ashley Meleana Joy Scholarship

This scholarship was established in loving memory of Ashley Meleana Joy KS '04 and will support students in the medical field.

- Pursuing a degree in the medical field
- Must be a graduate student
- Classified student in the medical field

Barry J. and Winona E. Rubin Memorial Scholarship

This endowment scholarship was created to honor the Honorable Barry J. Rubin, a family court adjudicator. Judge Rubin presided over youths caught up in the judicial system and he sought to empower underprivileged youths away from the juvenile justice system, providing educational opportunities. The Donor and spouse of Barry J. Rubin, Winona Ellis Rubin was born and raised on Kaua'i and played an instrumental role in the early movement of Hawaiian sovereignty. She is also a co-founder of Alu Like, Inc., creating a Hawaiian service organization that continues on today providing opportunities and services to Native Hawaiians.

- Must be enrolled full-time or part-time in a U.S. accredited institution recognized by Pauahi Foundation
- Major - Political Science, Law or Human Services
- Demonstrate financial need
- Describe your disadvantaged background, and in spite of those disadvantages, your potential for success.
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? How have these financial hardships affected your academic and personal life? What strategies or resources have you utilized to manage or overcome these financial challenges?

Bartels 'Ohana Scholarship

This endowed scholarship was created by the family of Wilhelm F. Bartels (Kamehameha Schools Class of 1951) 'ohana to honor and pay forward Ke Ali'i Pauahi's gift. The Bartels 'ohana has four generations of beneficiaries of Ke Ali'i Pauahi. Their wish is to pass along this gift to future generations so they can become industrious men and women to better serve the lahui.

- GPA - 3.5 minimum
- Must be a third or fourth year undergraduate or graduate student
- Must enroll full-time as a classified student in a U.S. accredited post-secondary institution recognized by Pauahi Foundation
- Priority will be given to students who reside on the U.S. Continent, while second priority will be given to graduates of KS.
- Submit at least one (1) letter of recommendation highlighting community service experience
- Must provide an essay that demonstrates applicant's strong desire to use their degree to give back to the lahui, leadership qualities, and commitment to the community

Benedict Kalamaku Lee Loy KS 1905 Scholarship

- GPA - Between 2.0 minimum to 3.0 maximum
- Recipient may be a graduate of any high school
- Recipient must be enrolled at least part-time in any accredited post-secondary program, including trade schools, community colleges, 2-year colleges and 4-year universities
- Demonstrate financial need
- Submit one (1) letter of recommendation from a teacher or counselor or employer or community organization who can comment on your overall character, achievement, and contribution to serve the greater community.
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? How have these financial hardships affected your academic and personal life? What strategies or resources have you utilized to manage or overcome these financial challenges?

Bernice Leinani Kuakini Ahlo and Henry Keanu Ahlo Scholarship

This scholarship was established by Henry Keanu "Hank" Ahlo in honor and memory of his mother, Bernice Leinani Kuakini Ahlo. Flexible use at Executive Director's discretion for post-secondary education.

Blaise A. Kepo'okelaokakai Baldonado Scholarship

- GPA - 3.0 minimum
- Pursuing a degree in the performing arts or a graduate degree in higher education

Blossom Mossman Nary Scholarship

This scholarship will provide assistance to a student not necessarily in the "honors" group, but rather a motivated student in the middle ranks of his/her class, who has persevered and selected demanding courses as appropriate for their abilities with the potential of completing a college degree.

- GPA - Between 2.0 minimum to 3.0 maximum
- Attend a University of Hawai'i system school

Brendan R. Akamu Imua Scholarship

Mr. Akamu is a veteran of Hawai'i's transportation, freight forwarding and airline industries, with expertise in perishable freight sales and marketing, logistics operations and Hawai'i state and federal technical/regulatory guidelines. He has also worked closely with the State of Hawai'i Department of Agriculture, U.S. Customs and Border Patrol, the U.S. Transportation Security Administration, FAA, USDA and Hawai'i Local/County government initiatives. As a graduate of the Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Campus, Mr. Akamu endeavors to live pono, with a deep belief in righteousness and balance. He proudly provides this scholarship in hopes it will reflect the spirit of I Mua - understanding that to move forward, Hawaiian students must first relate to the unique state functions today.

- Applicants must complete the online scholarship application which includes accomplishments, community service, awards and extra-curricular activities.
- Applicants must demonstrate commitment and focus on Transportation Logistics, Aeronautical/Aviation, or Tourism Management.

- Additional consideration can be given to those who demonstrate interest in Hawaiian language, culture, and history.
- Acceptance letter from a U.S. accredited school is required.
- Enrolled 2nd year or higher full-time as a classified student in a U.S. accredited post-secondary school institution recognized by Pauahi Foundation (Full-time is generally defined as: 12 credit hours per term for undergraduates or 9 credit hours per term for graduate and professional students; or the minimum number of credit hours specified by the degree program); or Enrolled in a graduate school.)
- Demonstrate financial need
- Applicants must provide at least two (2) letters of recommendation.
- Applicants must complete an essay question demonstrating how applicant's life has been impacted by challenging circumstances but has demonstrated continued persistence in achieving their goals and demonstrated the potential to be successful in college; and demonstrate good character and an intent to use their skills to benefit the Hawaiian community.

- Pursuing studies in S.T.E.A.M. (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math)
- Demonstrate financial need
- Submit an essay response to the following question: How do you intend to give back to future scholars?
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? How have these financial hardships affected your academic and personal life? What strategies or resources have you utilized to manage or overcome these financial challenges?

Gifts will be made in areas which are designed to align with the most common scholarship criteria: Preschool/Kindergarten support, STEM, Business, Natural Sciences, Computer Science, Architecture, Medicine, Leadership, Trade School/Community College, Special Needs, Immersion and Internships.

Charles Chuck Makaanui, Jr. Scholarship

- Applicant must be a senior or a graduate of a public high school
- Applicant must be pursuing a major in Art or Music
- Recipient may be enrolled part-time as a classified student in post-secondary school institution
- Priority given to applicants who are residents of Hawai'i Island
- Demonstrate financial need
- Submit a copy of your online artist portfolio that displays your completed artworks (photos of graphic art projects) or musical performance(s) to the Pauahi Foundation. Ensure that your artist

portfolio does not include any identifying marks such as your first or last name; instead, replace identifying marks (your name) with your KAPF ID number. Artist portfolios or artworks with identifying marks (your name) will not be considered. The artist portfolio must be received by the Pauahi Foundation before the application deadline.

- Full- or part-time enrollment is allowed

Charles P.M.K. Burrows Hui Lama Science Scholarship

This scholarship fund, established in 2002, seeks to support an outstanding science student and an active member of Hui Lama.

- GPA of 3.0 in 3 years of science courses including biology, chemistry and physics
- Major in Science fields
- Participation in a minimum 2 years of working with Hawai'i's natural and cultural environment through school and/or community service projects
- Priority given to those in conservation biology, environmental science or science education

Charles Reed Bishop Scholarship

This endowed scholarship was created to honor the legacy of Charles Reed Bishop and his 200th birthday milestone celebration of life.

- Major - Finance or Entrepreneurship
- Enrollment Status - Full-time or Part-time

Charles S. Iwata, Jr. Memorial Annual Scholarship

- Major - Hawaiian Studies or Hawaiian Language

Choy-Kee 'Ohana Scholarship

This scholarship recognizes annually, the academic achievement and efforts of worthy high school graduates pursuing a post-secondary education.

- GPA - 3.0 minimum
- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation; one (1) from a teacher or counselor and one (1) from a community organization who can comment on your overall character, achievement and contribution to serve the greater community
- Submit essay addressing what the biggest problem in Hawai'i is and how you would solve it.

Christine Alicata/Daisy Bell Memorial Scholarship

To assist an outstanding Kamehameha Schools graduate who has declared an interest in pursuing a college degree in the field of Home Economics, Nutrition, Food Service or any other health-related major.

- Major in Food, Nutrition or any health-related major
- Must be of good character, highly motivated and academically sound
- Demonstrate community service participation
- Demonstrate qualities of positive leadership

Class of 2000 Scholarship

This endowed scholarship was created to honor the Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Class of 2000 graduates.

- GPA - 3.0 minimum
- Must enroll full-time as a classified student in a U.S. accredited post-secondary institution, including trade, vocational and technical schools recognized by Pauahi Foundation
- Part-time enrollment allowed
- Non-traditional student defined as a single parent, sole provider, homeless, disabled or ward of the court
- Demonstrate financial need
- Must provide one (1) letter of recommendation from a teacher, employer or community organization leader who can comment on your overall character, achievement and contribution to serve the greater community.
- Must provide an essay response to the following question: The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? - Financial need may be considered in the selection

- One (1) letter of recommendation citing applicants credentials & potential for success
- Essay outlining the student’s eligibility and reasons why they deserve this gift
- Submit essay response to the following question: Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? - GPA - 2.0 minimum
- Demonstrate financial need

- Submit an essay response to the following question: How do you intend to give back to future scholars?

- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation from your school, employer or community organization who can comment on your overall character, achievement and contribution to serve the greater community

Darlene Kanohe MacAuley (KSK ‘89) ‘Ohana Scholarship

This donor desires to provide funds for students to attend post-secondary institutions who are pursuing an educational degree in Visual Arts, Performing Arts, Liberal Arts, or Entrepreneurship.

- GPA - 2.5 minimum
- Must demonstrate commitment and focus on visual arts, performing arts, liberal arts or entrepreneurship
- Must plan to attend a 4-year institution on the U.S. Continent
- Must enroll full-time as a classified student in a post-secondary school institution recognized by Pauahi Foundation
- Priority will be given to a U.S. Continent student.

- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation: one (1) from a teacher or counselor and one (1) from a community organization that can comment on your overall character, achievement, and contribution to serving the greater community
- Creativity, ideas, dreams, and vision for the future can be expressed in many ways – writing, art, performance, video, podcasts, or even a new business. How will you use your creative gifts to positively impact the local community and the world?

- Demonstrate through the personal statement questions, your plan on how this career will help make a difference in the community and family
- Demonstrate financial need
- Essay explaining how a career in one of these fields will help make a difference in your community and family

David Kauweloā & E. Darlene Kaupu Scholarship

- Must be enrolled full-time as a classified student in a post-secondary school institution
- Must remain in acceptable academic standing within their designated program
- Priority given to past and/or present residents of Molokaʻi
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? How have these financial hardships affected your academic and personal life? What strategies or resources have you utilized to manage or overcome these financial challenges?

David Lorch Music Scholarship

Honors the contributions of Mr. David Lorch, former Kamehameha Schools band instructor from 1967 to 1976.

- Major in Music
- Member of band or orchestra
- Scholarship should be gifted to 1 male and 1 female
- Must demonstrate a clear commitment to the music or the music field

Denis Wong & Associates Scholarship

- GPA - 3.5 minimum
- Pursuing undergraduate degree in Liberal Arts or Science, or a graduate degree in a professional field
- Demonstrate well-rounded and balanced record of achievement in preparation for career objectives
- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation from teachers, counselors, coaches or employers citing applicant's credentials and potential for success

Desha-Mulholland Scholarship

The Stephen L. Desha & John F. Mulholland scholarship is given in memory of a former graduate and Chaplain of the Schools. This scholarship is given to a boy or girl selected for his/her outstanding contribution toward furthering fine religious attitude and work on campus.

- Priority will be given to female students pursuing an education in advocacy for Native Hawaiian political development and part-time enrollment status.

- Priority will be given to KS alumni

Dwayne "Nakila" Steele Scholarship

- Demonstrate interest in the Hawaiian language, culture and history in addition to a commitment to contribute to the greater community
- Demonstrate financial need
- Submit two (2) letters of recommendation; one (1) from a teacher or counselor and one (1) from a community organization or other citing how the applicant is working toward perpetuating the Hawaiian language
- Describe the financial circumstances or hardships you have faced. Consider the following questions as you craft your response: What specific financial challenges have you encountered on your path to college? How have these financial hardships affected your academic and personal

Edward Lapsley/Ho'opa'a Mau Scholarship

- Must not be receiving any other scholarship from the Pauahi Foundation KS Senior scholarship pool

Edwin Mahiai Copp Beamer Scholarship

- Pursuing a career in Music, specifically Piano and/or Voice, with emphasis on Hawaiian Music, Opera or Musical Theatre
- Demonstrate a serious commitment to music training, a career in music and dedication to artistic excellence
